#### **Announcement of Prize-Winners**

#### 29 April 2021

The past year has witnessed a plethora of challenges to students and staff in higher education globally. Undeterred, students from across the UK and Ireland have generated some of the most compelling work ever submitted in the five year history of our Responsible Business and Management Writing Competition. Announcing the 2021 winners, Dr Jonathan Louw, Chapter Chair and Oxford Brookes competition organiser, has congratulated not only the winners but all those who entered on "grasping the opportunities presented by the Sustainable Development Goals and exploring their potential both conceptually and in a wide variety of applied organisational studies". He has also highlighted "the sterling contributions of this year's 11 volunteer judges from ten different universities (listed below), whose endeavours have ensured a rigorous and fair judging process".

The first prize in the undergraduate (UG) essay category is awarded to Melina Quenneville of the University of the Arts London for the account of her research into the normalisation of sustainability into the fashion choices of Generation Z. Summarising the judges' findings, Professor Natascha Radclyffe-Thomas and Dr Laura Steele, Co-Chairs of the UG Judging Panel, commended "An exemplary piece of work on a topical issue, representing a very significant undertaking for an undergraduate student". The second prize is won by Blaise Bonar of the University of Dundee for his well-researched case studies on sustainability in the brewing industry. The third prize goes to Antonio Ruggiero of the University of Durham —rewarding him for an engaging and ambitious "preliminary design for a more sustainable economic system".

The winner of the first prize in the postgraduate (PG) essay category is Marlene Reschberger, also of the University of the Arts London. Reflecting on Marlene's winning entry, Dr Jana Filosof, PG Panel Chair, praised "an excellent exploration of circular economy principles in the context of Adidas, involving a high quality analysis and both primary and secondary data gathering". Maurice Rosenstein of Edinburgh Napier University wins second prize for his study of "purpose beyond profit" in the context of SME entrepreneurs in Europe. Joint winners of the third prize were Anqi Luo of Oxford Brookes University (sustainable consumption in the Chinese fashion industry) and Sophie Coleridge of Cranfield School of Management (sustainability innovation at the Mars Corporation).

In the category of **Alternative Media (AM), Queen's University Belfast** has once again made a strong showing, with 3 out of the 4 top submissions from this institution. The first prize-winner is **Nicole Saunders** for a thought provoking video titled "Apple vs FBI: Privacy vs Security". Dr Victoria Pagan, Chair of the AM Panel, applauded a "fascinating and original topic, offering real insight and a well-developed





critical argument". In second place is **Carolina Nieto from Glasgow Caledonian University** with a video study of regenerative farming. Sharing the third prize are video-based ethical investigations by **Ethan Hall** (the VW emissions scandal) and **Daisy McElherron** (Boohoo and its supply chain).
