Responsible Business and Management Writing Competition 2019/20

Announcement of Prize-Winners

30 April 2020

At a time of global disruption, uncertainty and suffering the PRME Chapter UK and Ireland nonetheless draws hope from being able to announce the winners of its fourth annual Responsible Business and Management Writing Competition. Dr Alec Wersun, Chapter Chair, has called on all in the Chapter to "celebrate the variety and quality of the entries exploring the significance of the Sustainable Development Goals, the urgent nature of which could not be clearer in these pandemic times". He has also paid tribute to this year's 12 volunteer judges from nine different universities (listed below) – noting that "their skills and insights across a spectrum of ethics, responsibility and sustainability subjects have been invaluable in ensuring a robust judging process. This combination of student and staff endeavour shows the PRME community at its best".

The first prize in the undergraduate (UG) essay category is awarded to Autumn Irving-Carr of the University of Northumbria for her exploration of modern slavery. Summarising the judges' findings, Dr Jana Filosof and Dr Amir Keshtiban, Co-Chairs of the UG Judging Panel, commended "An outstanding essay demonstrating deep understanding of the topic and a personal interest...taking into account this was written by a second year student it was truly exceptional". The second prize is won by Ellie Ray of the University of Hertfordshire and the third prize-winner is Emily Herbert of the University of Newcastle – both of whom also demonstrated impressive research and writing skills.

In the category of **Alternative Media (AM), Queen's University Belfast** has made a clean sweep of the top three prizes. The first prize-winner is **Claire Kilpatrick** with a compelling video production titled "Voluntourism, a tale of two stories". Dr Victoria Pagan, Chair of the AM Panel, described her work as "excellent ...and thought provoking... highly relevant to PRME ... (with a) ... nuanced understanding of the ethical issues involved". The second and third prizes were won by **Bernard Cunningham and Dearbhaile McCann** – congratulations to them as well.

The winner of the first prize in the postgraduate (PG) essaycategory is Kathleen Pineau of Glasgow Caledonian University. Reflecting on Kathleen's winning entry, Dr Christine Gilligan, PG Panel Chair, praised "an excellent discussion of carbon neutrality strategies implemented at the national level... an intelligent as well as poignant argument in which the voice is clear and passionate yet intellectual and insightful". Students from Sussex University, Esme Piechoczek and Andrea Patane, won second and third prize respectively and were commended for their original topics and thoughtful research.





On behalf of the organisers, Chris Blackburn, Pro Vice-Chancellor and Dean of the Oxford Brookes Business School, has highlighted the "creativity, research skills and insights that were evident not only in the work of prize winners but also in that of other finalists and entrants across the board". He expressed "our heartfelt appreciation to staff and students who encouraged 82 entries from the 19 institutions listed in the tables below" and noted that "while, sadly, not everyone can be a prize winner the fact that so many business schools took part means that our planet might yet prove to be a winner in our current race against time".
